## IMAGES FOR LIVE TRAINING

Based on the **Primary** manual, this training has been designed to work flexibly, while emphasizing important training elements. It may be easily adapted by using the Secondary Manual outline for Lesson 1A. Lesson 1A in the Powerpoint may be skipped by pressing a button, and the lesson may be taught live by the trainer.

The central objectives of the training focuses on getting those being trained engaged with the manual and practicing teaching and discussing lessons with one another. These sections should be prioritized—teaching a component of 1B and a randomly selected group teaching of one of the lessons that seems most appropriate in an abbreviated form. A short break after about two hours should be included.

Teaching children Human Rights brings excitement and critical education to the classroom.</li> <li>The Colega manual teaches human rights found in the Universal Declaration of Humar Rights.</li> <li>The Colega manual includes lessons on Equality, Discrimination, Bullying, Marriage and Family, Religion or Belief, Education and Duty to the Community.</li> <li>As a member of the United Nations, your country has agreed to uphold and teach the principles and values found in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Colega materials have been developed to help you educate young people in your community on its principles.
